The National Association of Administrative Law Judges, established in 1974 as the National Association of Administrative Hearing Officers, is a nonprofit, professional organization dedicated to the improvement of the administrative hearing process. Federal, state, and local administrative law judges, hearing officers, referees, trial examiners and commissioners, including appellate authorities, exercising a wide variety of subject matter jurisdiction, belong to this Association.

We have members in every state, Canada, the Virgin Islands, Puerto Rico and Australia. The Louisiana Administrative Law Judges Association, the Virginia Administrative Law Judges Association and the Illinois Association of Administrative Law Judges are among its affiliated state chapters.

NAALJ strives to enhance the quality of administrative justice and to improve the process of dispute resolution. We serve as a forum for the exchange of ideas and information, conduct seminars and training conferences, publish a journal and newsletter, and consult with officials of state and federal governments on methods of improving administrative adjudication.

The National Administrative Law Judge Foundation, incorporated by NAALJ in 1980, is expressly devoted to the public interest. An annual \$1,000.00 Fellowship is presented for writing and delivering a scholarly paper on improving administrative law. Two \$500.00 scholarships are presented each year to one lawyer administrative law judge and one non-lawyer administrative law judge to attend the National Judicial College.

Full membership is open to persons employed by government agencies who preside over statutory fact-finding hearings or appellate proceedings arising within, among or before public agencies, or who prepare decisions for a higher tribunal. Law Professors, practitioners, and others concerned with administrative law are eligible for associate membership.

National dues for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1995 are \$35.
